Indian Art

Learning Objective:

To explore and create rangoli patterns.





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Rangoli is an art form from India which involves using coloured salt, rice or natural materials to create a pattern. Usually the patterns are in a circle shape, are quite large and take a long time to make.





Have you seen these patterns before?

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Can you remember what Diwali is?





Rangoli designs are made for Diwali and other Indian festivals. Diwali is the festival of lights that is held in honour of Lakshmi (the goddess of wealth and prosperity).

Rangoli patterns are made during this festival to bring good luck and to represent spirituality.



Did you know there are three main elements artists include when making a rangoli pattern? Do you know what they are?

The three main elements in a rangoli pattern are symbols, materials and background.



The <u>symbols</u> used in the design reflect Indian culture.



The materials used must be found in nature so both rich and poor people can make rangoli patterns.



Rangoli patterns must be created on a clear background.



Today you will be making your own rangoli designs. Look at the steps on the next slide to see how to make a rangoli pattern. Your teacher premade coloured salt for vou to use.






Use the outlines or draw your own rangoli outline on a paper plate. You can use pencil or felt pens to do this.



Add more coloured salt to the smaller sections and use your fingers to spread it around.



Start in the middle and paint a thick layer of PVA glue on the plate, in one section.



Continue doing this until your design is all filled in.




Carefully spoon some coloured salt onto the glue, trying to keep it in the section.



You might like to paint the outside edge or continue using the salt to finish the rangoli.




Pat down the salt using the back of the spoon until the section is filled.



You could add some sequins or even real flowers to your design.
