<u>To use speech marks (or inverted commas)</u> <u>to punctuate direct speech.</u>

The rules for speech are listed below - all four points need to be considered to punctuate a text correctly using speech marks.

SUCCESS	CRITERIA

1.	Put " around the words the speaker says.
	"Well done," he said.
2.	Begin what is spoken with a capital letter, even if it's not at the start of a sentence. She said, "Well done."
3.	Use a comma to separate the speaker from what is said.
	He said, "Well done." or "Well done," she said.
	Unless the speech ends with a ? or an !
	"Have you had tea yet?" he asked. "Stop!" shouted the guard.
4.	Start a new paragraph whenever someone new speaks.
	"What's the time?" asked James.
	"Seven o'clock " replied Sarah

Step 1 - To punctuate the following text, we would need to think about what each person says.

Tom and Barty should be here by now said Joshua. Don't worry responded Lucy Mae, I bet they are with Libby. No they aren't! snapped William. Libby is with Caitlin.

Step 2 - It might be easier for you to use different colour highlighters to show when each person talks. There are three people in this conversation; Joshua, Lucy Mae & William.

Tom and Barty should be here by now said Joshua. <mark>Don't worry</mark> <mark>responded Lucy Mae, I bet they are with Libby.</mark> No they aren't! snapped William. Libby is with Caitlin.

Step 3 - We can now apply all 4 rules in the success criteria box. Remember, when there is someone different speaking, we start a new paragraph in our writing.
