
SATS are now <u>not</u> going to take place but we acknowledge the value of the work that SATS assess and how this work will support your children with their transfer to their secondary school.

We were due to start a topic on the ancient Egyptians along with a school trip to Durham Oriental Museum. This is such a fascinating subject for children to study; we felt that the children would enjoy working on a mini project whilst at home.

We present these areas of study to be interpreted as you best see fit.

4) <u>What was the backstory of Howard Carter - archaeologist and what was so</u> incredible about the archaeological find of Tutankhamun's Tomb ?
